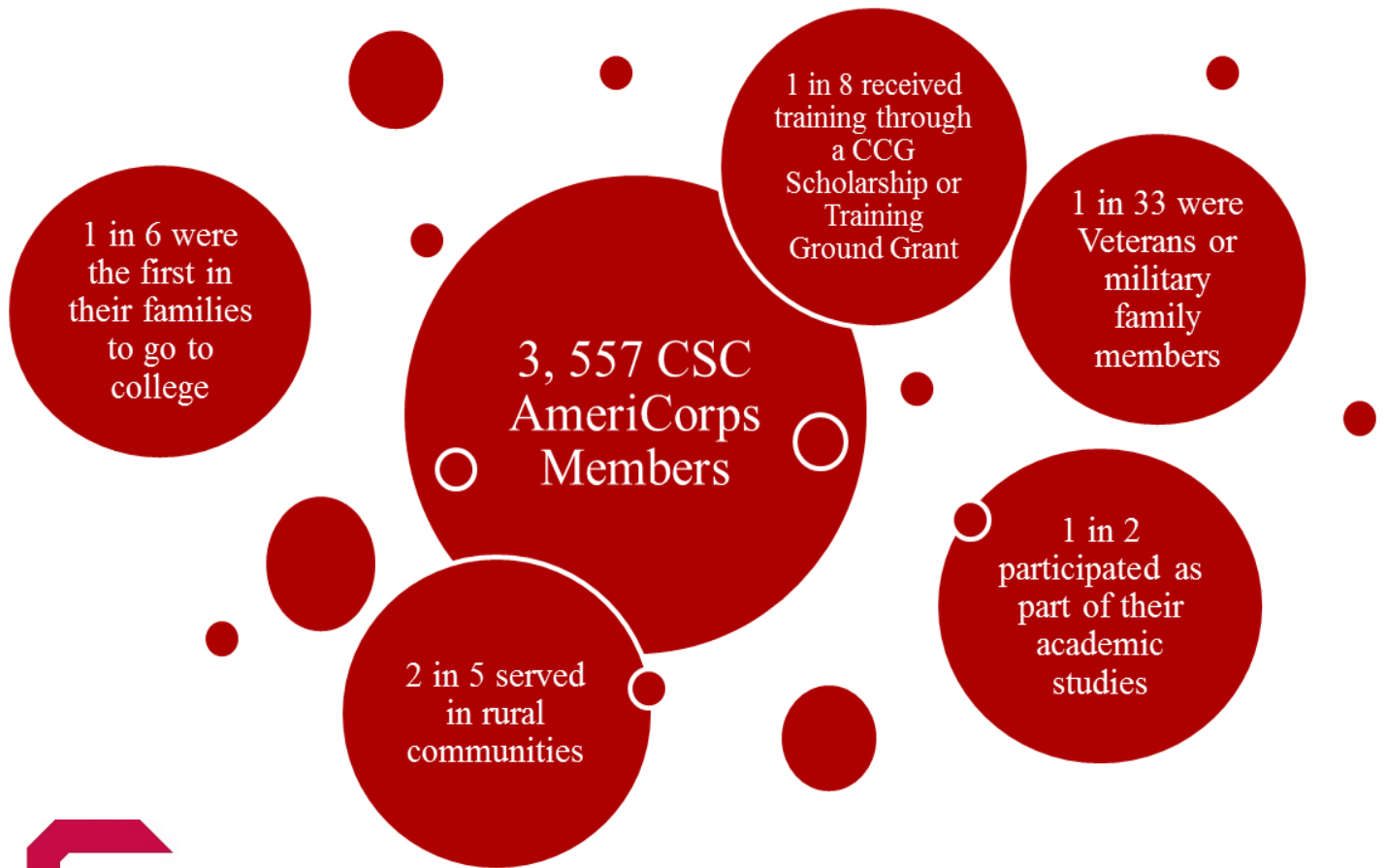

Who Are Compact Service Corps Members?



Strengthening Communities in the Mountain West

Compact Service Corps Members provided academic engagement support for K-12 youth, primary and preventive healthcare services in rural and medically underserved communities, and capacity building services for nonprofit organizations through 1,141 host sites in the region. Through their participation in CSC, students not only meet critical community needs in the short term, they also meet long-term needs specific to workforce shortages in high-need education and healthcare sites and in nonprofit and government agencies. Overwhelmingly, current research shows that individuals who train in high-need and underserved areas trend toward seeking employment in those same areas AND make a greater impact on student achievement and high-quality healthcare than their peers. Ninety-six percent of CSC Members plan on focusing their careers in critical-need areas, aligned with their CSC service site. Through skilled volunteer experiences, CSC Members are strengthening communities in the Mountain West now and into the future.



Service By the Numbers

- 3,557 Members in Arizona, Colorado, Montana, Nebraska, North Dakota, and South Dakota
- 1.7 million service hours
- \$30 million in economic impact

- 213,067 community members provided primary and preventive healthcare services

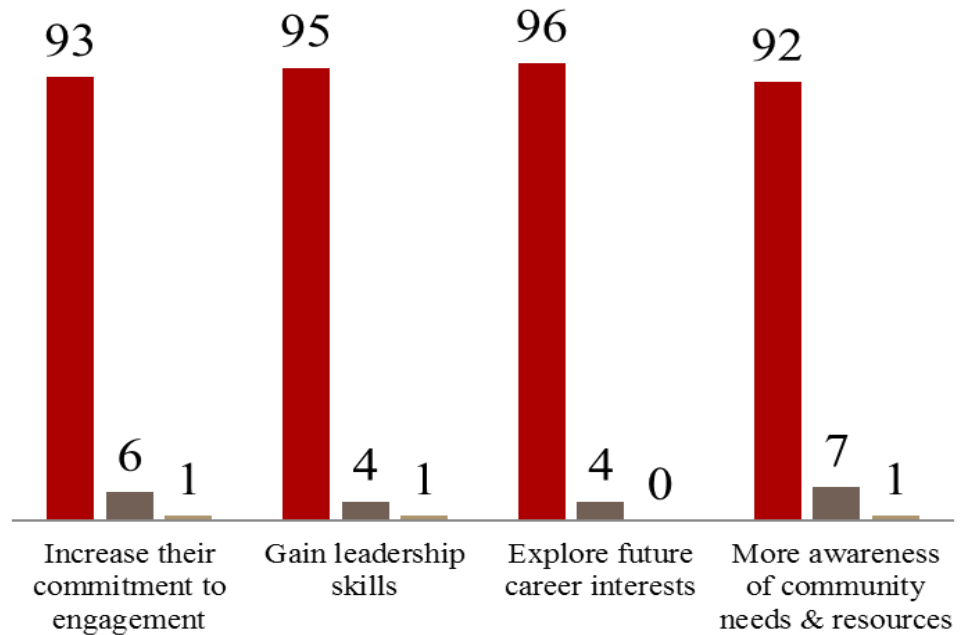

% of Members who report that CSC allowed them to...

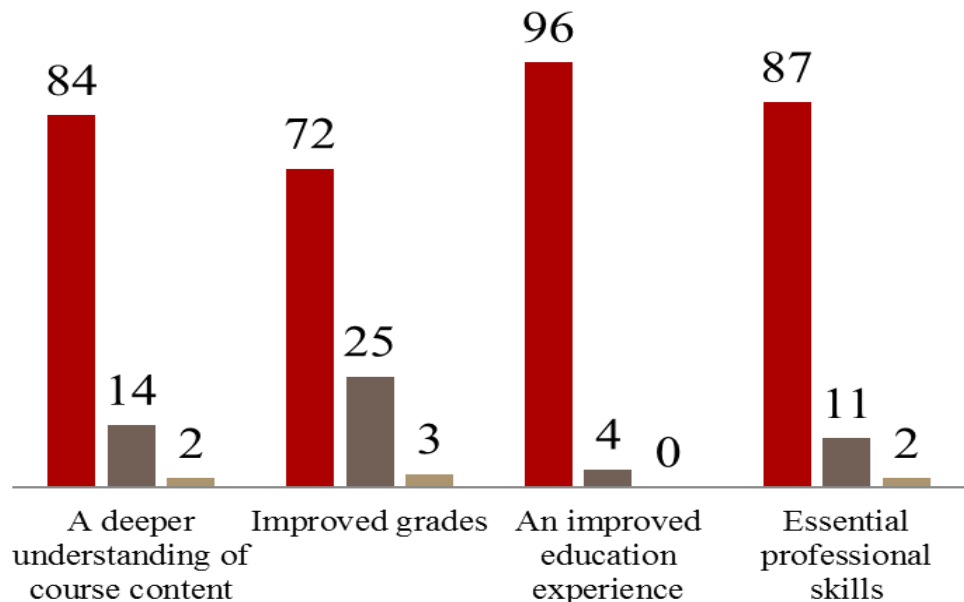
■ Agree ■ Neutral ■ Disagree

Impact on Academic Engagement

56% Special Education
25% Title I
24% F/RL > 50%
12% ESL/Bilingual Education
10% Academically underperforming

65,296 K-12 students enrolled in an education program
61,413 K-12 students retained in an education program

39,892 K-12 students increased academic engagement in their education program

Impact on Community Health

37% primary and/or preventive healthcare
18% mental health counseling
18% geriatrics
13% women's health
6% alcoholism/drug addiction counseling
5% dental health

213,067 individuals were provided primary and preventive healthcare services through the CSC AmeriCorps Program

57% of Site Supervisors reported that patients/clients received more comprehensive services
43% reported that patients/clients had increased access to healthcare services

Impact on Nonprofit Organizations

8,675 community volunteers recruited, trained, and/or managed by CSC Members

Community volunteers served 39,432 hours

50 nonprofits implemented 3 or more volunteer management practices

Reflections on Service

“Serving with Veterans and their families in the TBI unit at the VA hospital taught me a lot. I had one very difficult patient who had a lot of behavior issues. A couple of weeks into his stay I received a card from his wife thanking me for my work with her husband. She explained how much he had improved since I began working with him. I learned that gains and progress in therapy can be slow and not always easy to see. However, I must always put forth my best effort for each patient because I can be making a difference even when it is not obvious to me.”
